



ONWARD to a Shared Vision

We set a strategic vision for the future of mental health care, responding to emerging issues to strengthen resilience, drive prosperity, and mitigate risk.

From global conversations on the brain economy to bipartisan youth mental health solutions, this year’s work helped expand the reach of the movement — and the message — and define what comes next.

Mobilizing Leadership for Unified Action + AI Adoption

The Kennedy Forum President and CEO Rebecca O. Bagley was named Chair of the CEO Alliance for Mental Health, a collaborative of leaders representing 15 mental health organizations. In her first year, the Alliance delivered a set of unified priorities to Congress, including a pathway for AI integration in behavioral health. Led by the pioneering work of the American Psychological Association and CEO Arthur C. Evans, PhD, the group outlined the national approach for AI adoption and use, signaling the movement’s unity and forward progress.

Elevating Bipartisan, Cross-Sector Solutions for Youth Mental Health

As indicators flash red for young people’s mental health, we saw leaders drive meaningful action. As a member of the Bipartisan Youth Mental Health and Substance Use Task Force, the policy team contributed to a new report that helps deliver a roadmap to better care. Additionally, The Kennedy Forum’s work with its **School Based Industry Council** underscored practical solutions regarding emerging threats to young people’s well-being.

More than 50 experts worked together to combat this issue: “A national survey showed that nearly all indicators of poor mental health for teens worsened from 2013 - 2023.”

Participating in Global Conversations for Stateside Action

TKF leadership brought mental health to international audiences, beginning with our participation in **Davos during the World Economic Forum (WEF) alongside our partner West Health** to amplify the message that optimizing brain health through the life course will have a profound benefit on society. We also participated in the Lake Nona Impact Forum, bookended by numerous events during the U.N. General Assembly in September.

ONWARD Toward 90-90-90

The **Alignment for Progress Workshops** serve as opportunities to define, prepare, and stress-test our movement's strategy for reaching 90-90-90. We integrate the feedback and contributions from the leaders who attend into our strategic priorities and plans for the future.

This year, the Alignment for Progress movement put in hard work, delivering remarkable insights for tangible next steps to reach our 90-90-90 goals, with a focus on health parity, financing, and intervention with young people, as well as defining an approach to AI and structural change in government. Through two workshops in Chicago and D.C., we designed opportunities to get people in the room who don't typically intersect.

to Critical Mental Health Outcomes

We drive mental health and substance use outcomes, aligning decisionmakers and protecting consumers.

Our work protects and advances mental health success at the highest levels, and we value our long-term relationships across sectors. By responding in real time, we ensure mental health remains integrated, valued, covered, and protected across the nation's health care system.

Providers received a 2.5% bump in Medicare reimbursement for the vast number of psychological codes, thanks in part to comments from The Kennedy Forum.

From Volume to Value: Integrating and Improving Mental Health Care

In a major step for patients, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) embraced comments led by The Kennedy Forum that promote integration of mental health and substance use care into primary care. This means providers will have streamlined reimbursement codes, making it easier for people to get the right help in the right place, without unnecessary barriers.

Together with Shatterproof, we urged CMS to go beyond short-term savings and adopt smarter cost measures that reward the *long-term value* of prevention. Our proposed Net Present Value of Care (NPVoC) approach would give providers stronger incentives to prevent mental health and addiction challenges early, spark innovation, and lower costs over time.

Did you know?

Our policy lead's seminal research on NPVoC underpinned comments to the Administration, with findings that are now moving mental health care from volume to value.


Upholding Parity in States and Nationwide

Alongside founding strategic partners American Medical Association and Third Horizon, we published a breakthrough tool that brings real-time insurer data into the light. With it, regulators, employers, families, and health plans will finally have the transparency needed to identify and close parity gaps.



Parityindex.org helps turn Parity from promise into proof, capturing at-a-glance numbers in one visualization tool for the first time.





One terabyte of information equals about 6.5 million documents, or 13,000 filing cabinets. The Mental Health Parity Index evaluates multiple terabytes of insurer information to get the public real coverage data in an easy, visual chart.

The first findings of the Mental Health Parity Index uncovered real gaps in care: reimbursement for mental health services is on average 27% lower than reimbursement for physical health services.


Technical Assistance for Regulators: State Parity Workgroup

In our State Parity Workgroup, front-line advocates and regulators push mental health parity forward in every corner of the country. Members supercharge these efforts, flagging potential parity violations, sharing stories, and spreading our tools to agencies and partners to drive change faster.



The State Parity Workgroup has 275 members across 40 states, a direct line to those responsible for implementing, enforcing, and advocating for parity.

In 2025, four gold standard modules were published and viewed 3,700 times and downloaded by nearly 350 users.



Multi-Level Parity: State Parity Gold Standards

The Kennedy Forum and the Legal Action Center created the State Parity Gold Standards to help states turn parity from a mandate into real access. Developed through TKF's unique parity expertise and field-tested with advocates, these Standards are among the most comprehensive state-focused parity guidance available.



State Policy Leadership in California, Illinois, and New Jersey

In California, The Kennedy Forum's long-term work to advance [SB 855](#) implementation helped pave the way for a [landmark regulatory milestone](#). The California Department of Insurance announced new regulations to strengthen mental health parity enforcement and expand access to coverage — bringing the state closer to closing the gap between what parity promises and what consumers experience.


seek mental health care each year, meaning in California alone, [SB 855](#) will result in about 10 million people receiving more equal care.

Illinois continued a phenomenal run of victories, as Governor J.B. Pritzker signed a bill aimed at improving access to mental health care by increasing insurance reimbursement rates for therapists and reducing administrative barriers that have previously pushed providers out of insurance networks.

In her beloved home state, Amy was named to New Jersey Governor-elect Mikie Sherrill's Transition Team, joining a stellar group of bipartisan leaders who are engaging on key strategies for the state, advising on efforts related to Amy's decades of experience in youth mental health.



According to data from the Mental Health Parity Index's initial Illinois release, the relative difference in the available pool of in-network mental health providers is smaller (55% fewer) than that of physical health providers available statewide.

It was our honor to be named a Pathfinder organization for the Brain Economy Action Forum, organized by the [World Economic Forum \(WEF\)](#) and [McKinsey Health Institute](#), to help shape a vision where resilient, healthy brains are prepared to thrive in the “brain economy.” Together with partners like [West Health](#), we’re driving dialogue and action on brain health across the life course — pushing toward our vision of reaching 90-90-90 by 2033.

What is the brain economy? The Brain Economy runs on brain capital — which is a measure of brain health and brain skills that enable people to adapt, relate, and contribute meaningfully to society.



A company with 10,000 employees risks losing \$22.2 million per year in “brain capital” tax thanks to lost productivity and engagement.





Mental Health Budgeting and Finance Optimization

The Kennedy Forum is working with policy-makers, economists, and experts to reimagine how mental health is budgeted, scored, and financed at the highest levels. Our focus is on building sustainable investment pathways for early intervention, with particular attention to the mental health of children, adolescents, and young adults. Informed by multi-year research led by our [policy head](#), this work helps align evidence and policy design with federal budget realities.

Understanding How We Shift Federal Budgeting Decisions

1 Expose the blind spots

Show where federal budgeting overlooks prevention and long-term impact.

2 Speak CBO's language

Translate evidence into the cost and savings framework CBO uses.

3 Design for the score

Shape policy early so benefits appear within the budget window.

4 Test the assumptions

Adjust program details to strengthen how CBO counts impact.

5 Change the outcome

Shift policies from "new spending" to smart fiscal investments.



Our policy lead's research, published in a peer-reviewed journal and then syndicated widely, shows that early intervention programs have the capability to:

- Produce \$52 billion in additional federal funding over the next 10 years
- Contribute to \$5,658 in annual wages when depression is prevented in adolescence
- Help millions more students graduate high school and go on to college





This seminal research serves as the basis for The Kennedy Forum's Brain Health Economic Council work, which includes representatives from Moody's Analytics.

(CSC) Billing

We're working side-by-side with state-based health systems and nine CSC programs across five states to ensure coordinated specialty care for first-episode psychosis is reliably covered and paid for by commercial insurance, using CMS's new CSC billing codes.

Using MHPI TiC data, we've uncovered actionable CSC billing insights that help providers contract and bill more effectively, with less administrative burden from numerous CPT codes. With recent federal grant disruptions, there's new urgency (and opportunity) to shift CSC from a cost center to a sustainable, fully funded service line. We're helping partners navigate billing, reimbursement, and appeals, and turning hands-on implementation into a practical playbook for other systems and codes.



Only 10%–25% of individuals experiencing early psychosis currently receive CSC.

According to a 2024 report, if 90% of those who need coordinated specialty care received treatment, it would contribute approximately \$115 billion - \$140 billion in system savings.

Convening and Catalyzing Brain Health for Prosperity

System-wide, we're delivering practical blueprints for change. In collaboration with McKinsey Health Institute, we've created tactical guides that governors and Fortune 500 executives will pilot to strengthen workforce mental health.

The guides examine practical pathways — and tangible benefits — of investing in mental health care. Users can explore frameworks and data that undeniably make the case for mental health investment.

Fortune 500 companies employ approximately 30% of the U.S. workforce and are responsible for almost \$20 trillion in GDP. Implementation of parity would mark an incredible leap in our progress to 90-90-90.

Outreach Highlights: Working to Advance the Movement

Across the year, The Kennedy Forum showed up — bringing people together, sparking collaboration, and pushing for real change. These month-by-month highlights capture just some of the moments of momentum as we advanced policy, elevated lived experience, and strengthened the movement.

Forbes

Brain Health Emerges as Top Priority at Davos



Patrick and Amy participated in a conversation at Lake Nona Impact Forum highlighting how public/private partnerships can drive mental health outcomes.

January

- At Davos, **The Kennedy Forum and its partner West Health** led two brain health panels, sparking new global partnerships and interest. We brought the brain health conversation to wide audiences with coverage in **Forbes**, highlighting the shift from reactive sick care to holistic, early intervention.
- Senior Director of Policy was selected as a Consumer Liaison Representative for the National Association of Insurance Commissioners' Consumer Participation Program.

February

- The CEO Alliance for Mental Health, led by The Kennedy Forum, called on employers to step up and speak out for better mental health care.
- The Kennedy Forum was asked to participate in discussion on youth mental health — moderated by Dr. Chelsea Clinton — to elevate what young people need now, and how we can meet the moment.
- At the Lake Nona Impact Forum, leaders from The Kennedy Forum joined KPMG CEO Paul Knopp for “Hope Ahead,” sharing a bold vision for transforming mental health.

- In a deep-diving webinar, KPMG and [The Kennedy Forum](#) showed how advanced data insights can be used to measure progress in achieving mental health care access, treatment, and outcomes.
- The Kennedy Forum’s policy team and representatives from The Steinberg Institute testified in California on the state’s implementation of its parity laws and other mental health access issues, lifting up both progress and the work still needed to make parity a reality in practice.



Our state-level efforts in California stretch back years

March

- We discussed how parity can play a critical role at every stage of life during the 2025 Maternal Mental Health Forum alongside an impressive slate of providers, experts, and advocates.
- “Profiles in Mental Health Courage” was featured in [Axios](#)’ newsletter Finish Line: “I feel so blessed to be living in a time in which we’ve finally come to terms with this existential crisis that has befallen every single family since the beginning of time,” Patrick said of his book.



April

- The Kennedy Forum led a joint statement delivered to the Hill about the ERIC parity lawsuit, applauding President Trump’s Administration for successfully requesting an extension to respond to the ERIC lawsuit, offering our support in countering the suit.
- Leaders from the CEO Alliance for Mental Health gathered in person to align, strategize, and move as a unified group.



The CEO Alliance has allowed leaders to collaborate amid unprecedented shifts in the mental health community, sharing solutions as a team.

May

- At the Milken Global Conference, TKF leadership participated in a panel moderated by NBC News' Savannah Sellers, with panelists like *The Anxious Generation* author, Jonathan Haidt; Pinterest CEO Bill Ready; and American Psychiatric Association CEO and Medical Director Marketa Wills.
- We launched the Mental Health Parity Index in Illinois in partnership with the American Medical Association and Third Horizon. The Index launch was featured in a write-up by distinguished Chicago magazine, Crain's Chicago Business.
- While in Chicago, we held an in-person premiere of the public television program **Mental Health Care in America**, centering advocates who were able to see the program and talk about the unique issues facing our youth, featuring guests from our School-Based Industry Council. The Council also met in Chicago to discuss its strategies and projects that were presented at numerous national convenings.
- We joined our partners from Mobilize Recovery and leaders from the field to discuss and deliver recommendations to the Administration about how to combat America's issues with substance use disorder.



June

- The Kennedy Forum and Legal Action Center published the first two of six State Parity Gold Standards: State Codification and Generally Accepted Standards of Care.





These gold standards represent the opportunity to implement and enforce parity rules with consistency and potency across the states.



Each year, TKF supporters gather at the Cape to help discuss the year's progress and steps ahead for the movement.



July

- Together with The American Medical Association and Third Horizon, The Kennedy Forum [hosted a Mental Health Parity Index webinar](#), highlighting its applications for different stakeholders in the mental health and substance use disorder fields.
- Joining dozens of leading mental health organizations, we [released a joint statement](#) regarding the Big Beautiful Bill Act, which includes significant cuts to Medicaid that will reverberate through our health care system, including mental health care.
- Valued donors and partners gathered on the Cape in July to participate in sessions discussing how to value, support, and promote human capital development for dynamism and resilience in a changing world.

August

- The Kennedy Forum policy leads served as guest editors of a special edition of the [American Psychiatric Association Journal, Focus](#), focusing on the role of mental health professionals in advocacy and policy change.

September

- The Kennedy Forum leaders took our mission to the nation's capital. In conversations with leaders on Capitol Hill and within the Administration, one theme came through clearly: mental health must remain at the center of our national agenda.
- In celebration of being named a Pathfinder Organization with the Brain Economy Action Forum, [The Kennedy Forum released a video](#) about the importance of brain capital in the burgeoning brain economy.



The Kennedy Forum leadership was in D.C. to surface key mental health priorities.



Our leadership participated in numerous panels including events with Mindful Philanthropy and the Brain Economy Summit.

October

- The Kennedy Forum brought the mental health perspective into a week of U.N. General Assembly events, representing the field's biggest challenges and best plans.
- The Illinois General Assembly passed HB1085, a landmark step forward for mental health and substance use parity. For more than a decade, The Kennedy Forum has worked to advance mental health parity in IL.
- The Kennedy Forum held its first Alignment for Progress workshop in Chicago, Illinois, hosted by KPMG. The Kennedy Forum's School Based Industry Council presented its findings about sustainable school-based funding for mental health as the "blueprint for financing" at the Wellness Together conference.

November

- Patrick penned an op-ed for The Hill about the quality of care crisis, advocating for integrated care models — treating mental and physical health together — to deliver better outcomes and reduce costs over time.
- Additional modules of the State Parity Gold Standards were released on Corrective Enforcement Actions and Data Collection, Evaluation, and Reporting to aid regulators in ensuring better parity standards nationwide.
- TKF Leadership participated in the Kasich and Keller Podcast live from The Texas Tribune Festival with Meadows Mental Health Policy Institute President and CEO Andy Keller.

December

- The Kennedy Forum held its second and final Alignment for Progress workshop in Washington, D.C. at KPMG.

- Governor J.B. Pritzker officially signed the landmark parity bill HB 1085, improving access to mental health care by increasing insurance reimbursement rates for therapists and reducing administrative barriers that have previously pushed providers out of insurance networks.
- The School-Based Industry Council presented its white paper, which is considered the blueprint for financing mental health in schools, at the Advancing School Mental Health Conference (ASMH), hosted by the National Center for School Mental Health (NCSMH). The presentation reflects the strength and growing recognition of this work within a highly competitive program.
